Jobs in pipeline for Poundbury

UP to 100 jobs could be created if new offices overlooking the historic gateway to Dorchester are given the go-ahead.

A large governmental organisation relocating to Dorchester is already in the pipeline to take over part of the 25,000 sq ft site in Sherperton Street, toward Monkey Jump roundabout, at the western end of Poundbury.

Another business, which cannot be named as final negotiations are still taking place, has also shown an interest and is in talks with developer Derek Newell, director of Woodpecker Properties Ltd.

Mr Newell said: "We cannot say too much about the businesses as we are still in talks and one of them is governmental, but we hope that around 50 per cent of the employment there will be new jobs. We want to see new workers in Poundbury and young blood moving to the town.

"At this stage, the plan has had good local support from the residents' association and a positive response from consultation. It will be quite a dominating building but a stunning piece of architecture.

Spokesman for site owners, the Duchy of Cornwall, Simon Conibear said the offices will be adding to the mixed use in Poundbury to help meet the needs of Dorchester and the surrounding area.

"We feel encouraged by this proosal, as it is addressing the needs of local people and attracting well-established organisations that are looking to relocate to somewhere such as Dorchester," he said.

Letwin is out-gunned over smoking ban

WEST Dorset MP Oliver Letwin was one of the minority to vote against an all-out smoking ban in pubs, restaurants and private clubs in England on Tuesday.

Smoking will be outlawed by summer 2007 after MPs in the House of Commons voted for the ban by 384 to 184, a majority of

But Mr Letwin, a cigar smoker, said he had supported the Government's initial proposal for a partial ban, exempting private clubs and pubs which do not serve food.

"I do not think there is a perfect solution to this issue but I am sure we will all learn to live with a complete ban. There is a very strong case for preventing smoking in places where staff are working and where non-smokers can be affected." he said.

North Dorset MP Bob Walter also voted against an all-out smoking ban while South Dorset MP Jim

Knight supported the prohibition, which will also outlaw smoking in almost all workplaces and enclosed public places. Only private homes, care homes, hospitals, prisons and hotel bedrooms will be exempt.

Licensees could be fined up to £2,500 for not enforcing the ban and individuals will face a £50 on-the-spot penalty.

Health professionals have welcomed the ban amongst warnings that pubs and clubs could close.

"The building will also be an important one, in that it will be the western gateway to Poundbury and Dorchester and, for the first time in this area, will include underground parking."

Mr Conibear also said that consultations have been on-going with residents whose homes adjoin the site.

The grand multi-level design, created by London-based architect Barbara Weiss, will see the offices wrap around the corner of Bridport Road and Paceycombe Way.

More than 90 parking spaces will be provided under and over ground for the employees and the rendered and brickwork offices will be split into two, three and four storeys, as well as featuring a tower and large windows.

Plans for the offices were submitted to West Dorset District Council on 30 January and are yet to be registered by planning officials. It is hoped they will be available for public viewing and comments early next week.

The jobs boost comes as Dorse

The jobs boost comes as Dorchester has been designated a Dorset major development town, with 200 homes a year planned until 2020.

Around 120 of these will be built in the next phase of Poundbury, with the remaining 80 earmarked for central Dorchester.

President of Dorchester and District Chamber of Commerce, Industry and Tourism, Rob Fox, said: "Poundbury is a vital part of the town and we have been working hard to ensure it is seen as an inclusive part of Dorchester business.

"We do not want to see any segregation of Poundbury to Dorchester town centre.

"Any increase in jobs in the area is welcome, particularly with the number of houses being built in Dorchester."
